DOG PARK ETIQUETTE: A GUIDE FOR PET PARENTS

BEFORE YOU GO:

- Vaccinate & Protect: Ensure your dog is up to date on vaccines (Rabies, DHPP, Bordetella) and on flea/tick preventatives.
- Healthy & Non-Aggressive Only: Sick, injured, or aggressive dogs should stay home.
- Know Your Dog's Personality: Parks aren't for every dog! If your pup is anxious, overwhelmed, or has a history of aggression, consider other forms of exercise and enrichment.
- Pack the Essentials: Bring poop bags, water, and any needed supplies.

INSIDE THE PARK:

- 1. Supervise Constantly: Stay alert and keep an eye on your dog at all times.
- 2. <u>Pick Up After Your Pet</u>: Always clean up waste promptly, it's courteous and helps prevent the spread of disease.
- 3. <u>Watch the Gate</u>: Enter and exit quickly to avoid escapes. Only unleash your dog once safely inside the double-gated entry.
- 4. <u>Use the Correct Area</u>: Follow posted rules about designated areas for small or large dogs, if available.
- 5. Monitor Play Behavior:

Healthy play looks like:

Play bows

Chasing (taking turns)

Pauses / taking breaks

Loose, wiggly body language

Red flags include:

Stiff body posture Prolonged staring

Snarling, snapping or mounting

Stiff and upright tail

6. <u>Leave Toys & Treats at Home</u>: These can trigger possessiveness or fights between dogs.

PLEASE DON'T:

- Bring puppies under 4 months (they're too vulnerable).
- Bring dogs in heat.
- Let your dog bully or overwhelm others.
- Allow digging without filling holes afterward.
- Bring more dogs than you can safely manage.

PLEASE BE KIND TO OTHER HUMANS:

- Ask before petting someone else's dog.
- Don't offer food or treats to dogs that aren't yours.
- Respect other pet parents' boundaries and comfort levels.

WHEN IN DOUBT, STEP OUT:

If your dog seems stressed or isn't playing nicely, it is okay to take a break or head home. You are your dog's best advocate and safety net.
